WTIC-TV PLANS FIRST COLOR TELECAST OF GREATER HARTFORD OPEN IN AUGUST

WTIC-TV will add another color first Aug. 19 and 20 when it televises the Greater Hartford Open in color for the first time.

Five color cameras will be used to cover play on the 16th, 17th and 18th holes during the third and fourth rounds. Plans are also being made to cover the 15th hole in the event of a sudden death playoff.

The GHO, formerly the Insurance City Open, is the second major sports event to be televised in color by WTIC-TV this season. In June, the station televised the Harvard-Yale Regatta in color--also for the first time.

BOWE HAS FILM OF FEET DOUBLING FOR A STAR'S

George Bowe has absolute proof that he was a swinger 41 years ago.

He recently received a print of a sequence of a Warner Brothers film, "So This Is Paris," in which he appeared with his high school girl friend in 1926.

In "So This Is Paris," Bowe and his partner danced the Charleston along with hundreds of others on a rather lavish set.

"Since they worked us in the foreground, we are quite prominent in much of the sequence, which runs about five minutes. Ernst Lubitsch directed and the stars were Monte Blue, Lillian Tashman and May Mac-Avoy," Bowe recalls.

"Blue and Miss Tashman couldn't Charleston, so Lubitsch filmed our feet doubling for the stars. The Charleston sequence is part of a film documentary, "Evolution of the Modern Dance," shown periodically at the American Museum of Modern Art in New York. I was able to secure the Charleston print with the assistance of 'A Single Step' director Norman Weissan, a friend of the museum's curator.

"My daughters recognized me immediately and commented on the similarity of today's dancing. It's quite a thrill to see yourself as a swinging teenager 41 years ago in a silent Hollywood movie--and if anyone wants to challenge me, I'll take then on in the Charleston today."

MRS. GERTRUDE L. MC AULIFFE

Mrs. Gertrude L. McAuliffe, 84, the first person to sing on WTIC, died June 22 in Hartford.

Mrs. McAuliffe, a contralto, sang on the first WTIC broadcast Feb. 10, 1925. A well-known singer in the Hartford area, she was a member of several vocal groups and was featured on the Travelers Hour as well as the station's pioneering music appreciation program for school children. She also sang with the

I Heimberger Trio, which was also frequently featured on WTIC in the 1920s.

Mrs. McAuliffe also sang at the First Church of Christ, Congregational, the Asylum Hill Congregational Church and Temple Beth Israel. In later wears, she was a third grade teacher at the Yeniva School of Hartford.

Funeral services were held June 24 at the Asylum Hill Congregational Church.
