

BROADCAST-PLAZA, INC. FORMS FILM-MAKING SUBSIDIARY

Broadcast-Plaza, Inc. announced the formation of a new subsidiary, Plaza Productions, Inc., July 28.

The new corporation, which will continue operations in its present quarters temporarily, is comprised largely of persons formerly associated with the audio-visual unit of the Public Information and Advertising Department of the Travelers Insurance Companies. CONSTITUTION PLAZA TO BE SITE OF STATE'S LARGEST FLOWER SHOW

Constitution Plaza will be the site of the largest garden and flower show ever held in Connecticut Sept. 17 through 23.

Plans for the 1967 Plaza Garden Fair were announced by Roger C. Wilkins, general chairman, and Mrs. Richard G. Willard, assistant chairman. Mr. Wilkins is senior vice president of the Travelers Insurance Co. and vice chairman of Broadcast-Plaza, Inc. Mrs. Willard is secretary of the Connecticut Horticultural Society, which is playing a major role in planning the Plaza Garden Fair. The fair is being sponsored by Broadcast-Plaza, Inc.

Virtually every available indoor and outdoor location on Constitution Plaza will be utilized for the Garden Fair exhibits, which will range from African violets to apples and from rhodedendrons to rock gardens.

other establishments. Executives of the new corporation are James W. Wille, Vice President and Manager, and Stillman Shaw III, Operations Manager.

To increase its operating capacity, Plaza Productions in the near future will occupy a building on Main St., East Hartford which formerly housed a Grand Union market. The building will be redesigned to provide 16,000 feet of work space. Two sound stages will be erected, one of which will be the largest in the central Connecticut area. Modern communications equipment and lighting will be installed throughout.

Operation of Plaza Productions, in its new quarters will use the services of twenty full time employees plus a network of audio-visual professionals, capable of providing film or recordings from areas remote from Hartford.

In making the announcement, Broadcast-Plaza, Inc. stressed the need in this area of an organization such as Plaza Productions, to provide high quality motion pictures, video and audio tape recordings, and other communications necessities for businesses, advertising agencies, educational and other institutions.
