BIG QUESTION IS A BIG HIT AS 21,400 VOTE IN FIRST WEEK

On Sept. 18, WTIC Radio and Television inaugurated "The Big Question," a new service that gives the public an opportunity to vote on major issues of the day by dialing special telephone numbers.

During its first week on the air, "The Big Question" attracted 21,400 voters.

Special equipment has been installed in Broadcast House to record and tabulate the telephoned votes each evening. The question is asked on radio and television at 6:25 and reported at the end of the 11 p.m. newscasts.

Executive Vice President Patricelli was responsible for the planning of the new service. "The Big Question" was inaugurated to give listeners and viewers an opportunity to express themselves on important and interesting current issues. It is also serving as an informal and instant public opinion poll.

STATIONS RECEIVE FREEDOM AWARD FROM CHAPTER OF B'NAI B'RITH

WTIC Radio and Television were cited Sept. 27 for their outstanding contributions to the preservation of freedom and democracy by the Ararat Chapter of B'nai B'rith. Mrs. Harold Blum, counselor of the 50,000-member District 1 of B'nai B'rith, presented the award to Leonard Patricelli, executive vice-president of Broadcast-Plaza, Inc., who accepted it on behalf of President Paul Morency. The women's organization paid tribute to the station's forthright coverage of the news, outstanding public information service and their unbiased and factual reporting.

Former Congresswoman Chase Going Woodhouse, honorary chairman of the luncheon meeting, hailed the stations for their "careful balancing of the right to know with the right of equal justice for all." She said the stations showed responsible reporting in covering recent disturbances in Hartford and New Haven. Secretary of State Ella Grasso, another speaker, said the stations were truly the voice of freedom.

BROADCAST-PLAZA PRESENTS REINDEER TO SHERWOOD FOREST CHILDREN'S ZOO

Three white reindeer, of the Donder and Blitzen variety, arrived in Hartford September 7 to become permanent residents of the Sherwood Forest Zoo in Keeney Park.

The white reindeer, formally known as "European White Fallow Deer," were presented to the children of Connecticut by Broadcast-Plaza, Inc.

The reindeer are in Hartford because President Morency happened to be watching the CBS Evening News with Walter Cronkite on Channel 3 last July 14. That evening, Cronkite used a story about a southern California land developer who had a herd of more than 400 white reindeer that he was willing to reduce by giving them to zoos, parks and other public places where they would get proper care and be enjoyed by a great number of people.

The land developer, Fritz B. Burns, had been raising reindeer since 1951, when he purchased nine of them from the William Randolph Hearst Estate at San Simeon, Calif. At Christmas, the reindeer frolicked at a large southern California shopping center and during the rest of the year, they roamed Burns' ranch in the San Fernando Valley (Continued on Page 4)

A new, 2¹/₂-hour Saturday show, more Bob Steele, an expanded "TIC Afternoon Edition" and several other programming changes will be made on WTIC AM during the week of October 2.

The major innovation is "Saturday Showcase," a $2\frac{1}{2}$ -hour program featuring Dick Bertel, that will be similar in format to the successful "Sunday Showcase" with Arnold Dean. Bertel will play carefully selected vocal and instrumental popular music that showcases the particular talents of the performer or group being featured.

In addition to music, "Saturday Showcase" will have weekly features by Jean Colbert, WTIC's director of women's programs, and Bill Clede, outdoors editor of WTIC and The Hartford Times. Bertel will also continue as host of the Monday through Friday evening "Americana," which will be broadcast from 7:05 to 7:25, beginning

Monday. Two other Saturday programs will be on the air in new time periods: "Garden Time" with Frank Atwood and Corinne Willard, 10-10:15 a.m., and "Modern Living" with Bertel and Fredda Schlien, 10:15-10:30.

By this year, the original nine had grown to a herd of more than 400, and Burns decided to give some of them to a national park. He found, however, that there was no room at national parks, so he turned to the news media with his offer. The story was picked up by newspapers, radio and television stations throughout the nation and requests began to pour into the San Fernando Valley.

Mr. Morency contacted the Hartford Park Department and offered to assume all shipping costs and to provide funds for a suitable home for the reindeer at the park. The offer was enthusiastically accepted.

Burns was contacted in California and agreed to present three of his reindeer to Broadcast-Plaza, Inc., the only organization outside California to receive any of the herd up to the present time.

The reindeer left Los Angeles by plane September 6 and arrived at Kennedy International Airport the following morning. Because a 12hour wait, plus shipment to Newark Airport, would be required to continue the journey to Hartford by air, WTIC arranged to have the reindeer picked up by truck at Kennedy as soon as they landed. They were expected in Hartford in the early afternoon. Mr. Patricelli presented the deer to Mayor George B. Kinsella, who accepted them on behalf of the children of the Hartford area.

The reindeer will be temporarily quartered in one of the zoo's existing enclosures until a suitable home is constructed. Broadcast-Plaza, Inc. will provide funds for the quarters.

"Reindeer," said Director Everett J. Pyle of the Department of Parks and Recreation, "have always enjoyed a special status in the animal kingdom and I want to be sure that our exhibit properly reflects their dignity."
