#### BEETHOVEN'S BEEP ON KEY AFTER QUARTER CENTURY

After a quarter of a century of turning over in his grave every hour on the hour, the late Ludwig Von Beethoven can now rest easy. The first four notes of his "Fifth Symphony" are finally being played in the proper key on WTIC.

The musical three dots and a dash, World War II's "V for Victory" sign, has been WTIC's time signal since 1943. It was the wartime brainchild of Leonard J. Patricelli and Irwin C. Cowper.

The original mechanical device was built by WTIC engineers with the material then available in wartime, a gear arrangement from a 1930s radio and tubes from the same era. The makeshift mechanism was durable, however, and didn't wear out until mid-March--after more than 200,000 hourly performances.

When the old device beeped its last, engineer Bill Kolouch quickly set about creating a replacement --a solid state device with no moving parts--and WTIC listeners were without the familiar time signal for only a day.

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#### AHEARN-PERRUCCIO

NEW WTIC PUBLIC OPINION POLL USES RANDOM SAMPLE TECHNIQUE

The WTIC News Public Opinion Poll, a weekly television poll on a major issue, was introduced by WTIC Radio and Television on March 20 when more than 1,000 Connecticut and western Massachusetts residents were called and asked to state their presidential preferences.

WTIC is using the random sample technique to gather opinions from a cross section of Connecticut and Massachusetts residents once each week. The poll topic is announced on the 6 p.m. radio and 6:15 p.m. television newscasts and the results are announced on the 11 p.m. newscasts.

More than 1,000 residents of the area served by WTIC Radio and Television are telephoned each week. The number of calls to each section of Connecticut and western Massachusetts will be determined by the population of each area.

President Patricelli said "the poll is a logical outgrowth of the Big Question service inaugurated last September. It is also a major improvement in the polling technique employed for the Big Question. The WTIC News Public Opinion Poll will use one of the most generally accepted of all modern polling techniques in order to obtain an accurate reflection of public opinion on the most vital issues of the day."

Gene Muriaty selected the area that is being polled and planned the random sample. He is also supervising the weekly poll as it is conducted by nine members of the secretarial staff. Rufus Coes is assisting Muriaty in all phases of the poll.

The first question asked in the WTIC News Public Opinion Poll March 20 was: "If the election were held today, who would be your choice for President?"

President Johnson received the most votes, 20.9 per cent, but this was less than the combined votes of his adversaries, Sen. Robert Kennedy, 16.3 per cent, and Sen. Eugene McCarthy, 12.4 per cent.

Richard Nixon polled the most votes for the Republicans, with 14.8 per cent, and Gov. Nelson Rockefeller trailed with 8.5 per cent.

George Wallace received .7 per cent of the votes. Various other candidates received 1.5 per cent and  $2^4.7$  per cent were undecided.

The March 27 question was: "If the election were held today and Johnson and Nixon were the candidates for president, for whom would you vote?"

Mr. Johnson received 37.2 per cent; Mr. Nixon, 35.2 per cent, and 27.5 per cent were undecided or said they preferred neither candidate. There were 807 responses.

### GREEK ORTHODOX PRIEST WILL SPEAK AT PLAZA

The third annual Easter Sunrise Service on Constitution Plaza will again be televised and broadcast by WTIC TV and Radio.
